

IN HISTORY OF SCHOOL

The high school enrollment this year is the largest in the history of the school with 70 pupils enjoying the benefits that are a natural result of a larg er system. This enrollment has increased from 43 enrolled in 1938, or an increase of 61 percent in the last three years. In all probability, this increased enrollment is due to the fact that more students of high school age realize more and more the importance of a high school education in this vast and highly industrialized United States in which we are privileged to live. Time spent in school pays high dividends later on in life. We have every reason to believe that the high school will continue to

We believe that Elba is an outstanding system. It attracts more and more tuition students each year. Prior to 1939, the greatest number of tuition students was 15. In 1939 tuition students numbered 16 and in 1940 they numbered 24. This year 30 non-resident students have chosen Elba as their institution of learning. Here students can prepare themselves for the vocations of their choice, being able to choose between college preparatory, commercial, vocational and general academic courses.

In the past ten years the Elba High School attendance has increased 40%, while the grade school attendance has decreased 10%. In order to relieve the crowded conditions in the high school, a fourth teacher has been added this year and one teacher has been dropped in the grades. Miss Gdanitz has grades

primary, first and second with a total enrollment of 33 pupils, Miss Jacobsen has grades three, four and five with a total enrollment of 23 and Miss Blazek has grades six, seven and eight with a total enrollment of 28. The enrollment by grades are given on page 2. The primary room enrollment is high but that room is the same as it always has been with primary, first and second grades being in that one room. The enrollment in the other two grade rooms is average, as larger systems usually have 30 pupils per teacher.

Our increase in high school attendance and our decrease in grade school attendance is: in keeping with all the other schools of the state. There were 14,240 more students in Nebraska high schools in 1939-40 than in 1930-31, an increase of 20%. There were 29,034 fewer pupils enrolled in village elementary grades of Nebraska in 1939-40 than in 1930-31, a decrease of 19%.

The total enrollment of elementary and high school students this year is greater than it has been since 1930 when the enrollment was 150 and 99 of that number were in the elementary grades, as compared to 153 this year of which 83 are in the elementary grades. So you see the load has switched to the high school and thus necessitating the fourth teacher and more space for high school use. The decrease in the elementary department has merely made room for an ever expanding high school, both from the standpoint of space and pupil-teach-*1013 313 4000 Tho 31 er load.

Age Ways to Love and Support Your Child

- 0-1 · Hold your baby and look at her or him during feedings.
 - · Respond to your child's needs.
 - · Take delight in your child's development.
- 2-3 · Cheer your child on as he or she masters new skills.
 - · Touch your child often. Hug. Cuddle.
 - · Say "yes" more than you say "no."
- 4-5 Encourage your child's thinking abilities by exposing her or him to new situations.
 - · Play with your child, letting her or him choose the type of play.
 - · Find other caring adults to participate regularly in your child's life.
- 6-10 Encourage your child as he or she learns new skills.
 - · When you and your child disagree, point out you still love her or him.
 - · Answer all your child's questions.
- 11-15 · Accept the identity your child is forming.
 - · Affirm independence and interdependence.
 - · Be available to listen.
- 16-18 · Continue to show affection for your teenager.
 - · Let your teen overhear you complimenting her or him to someone else.
 - · Ask for your teen's opinion or advice on something important.
